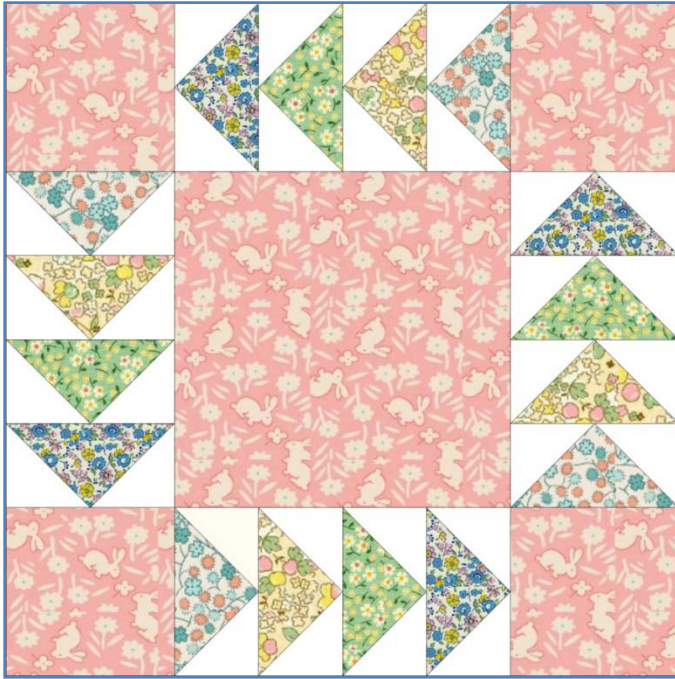

Thirties Fabrics Free Pattern Number 7

Geese Around Bunnies & Squares And Triangles



Cutting Instructions for Geese Around Bunnies Block:

Pink Bunnies: Cut one 6 ½ inch square, Cut four 3 ½ inch squares

White Background (sky in the flying geese units: Cut thirty two 2 inch squares

Each of the four remaining prints used as the flying geese: Cut four 2 x 3 ½ inch rectangles.

*Follow the directions for making flying geese on the next page

Piece your block using the picture as a guide.

Press the block and square to 12 ½ inches square.

Cutting Instructions for Squares and Triangles Block:

White Background: Cut eight 3 inch squares

Dark Blue Print: Cut eight 3 inch squares

Green Print: Cut four 2 ½ inch squares, Cut one 8 ½ inch square

Multi Colored Speckled print: cut four 4 ½ inch squares

Make 16 triangle squares using the white and blue squares:

Draw a diagonal line on the wrong side of the white squares. Place a white square and blue square right sides together. Stitch ¼ inch on both sides of the drawn line. Cut on the drawn line, open the triangles squares, press to the dark print. Square each triangle square patch to 2 ½ inches square.

**Make the Square in a Square center using the shared corner method described on the next page.

Piece your block using the picture as a guide.

Press the block and square to 12 ½ inches square.

*Flying Geese:

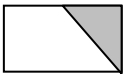
Draw a diagonal line on the wrong sides of your “sky” squares (white in this case)



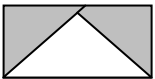
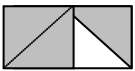
Place a “geese” rectangle and “sky” square right sides together and stitch on the line you have drawn.



Leaving a ¼ inch seam allowance, cut away the excess fabric and press open toward the sky. *If you cut away only the excess from the square fabric and leave the geese rectangle whole, your flying geese unit will retain its shape better than if you cut it away.

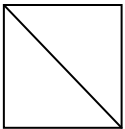


Repeat this process for the other side of your rectangle:

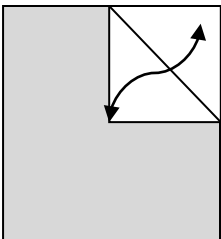


**Square in a Square:

Draw a diagonal line on the wrong side of each of the four smaller squares you will use to surround the inner square.



Place a smaller square right sides together with the larger inner square, lining up the corner as shown:



Stitch on drawn line. Fold the triangle up toward the corner of the inner square. Press. If you cut away only the excess from the smaller square fabric (which is now in the middle of the large square and the shared corner) and leave the large square whole, your square in a square unit will retain its shape better.

Do the same with the other three small squares until you have a square in a square. Be sure there is ¼ inch seam allowance around the inner square.
